"So maturity is not never going down?"

"It is also more truthful."

They spoke about Paul's thorn, human limitation, and the difference between growth and perfection.

Mental fit asked whether the practical work of daily life could be carried with ease, patience, and respect.

Intellectual fit asked whether both minds could remain alive through curiosity, learning, and thoughtful disagreement.

Ethereal fit named the quieter experience of resonance and presence, always tested through character, time, and reality.

She added four witnesses:

Character.

Time.

Freedom.

Reality.

A whole-person fit never required identical intensity across every dimension. It required enough life and coherence for a relationship to grow truthfully.

She also considered ordinary compatibility: rest, pace, work, family, money, travel, privacy, household life, and the ways two callings would share space.

More of You in the woman I continue discovering.

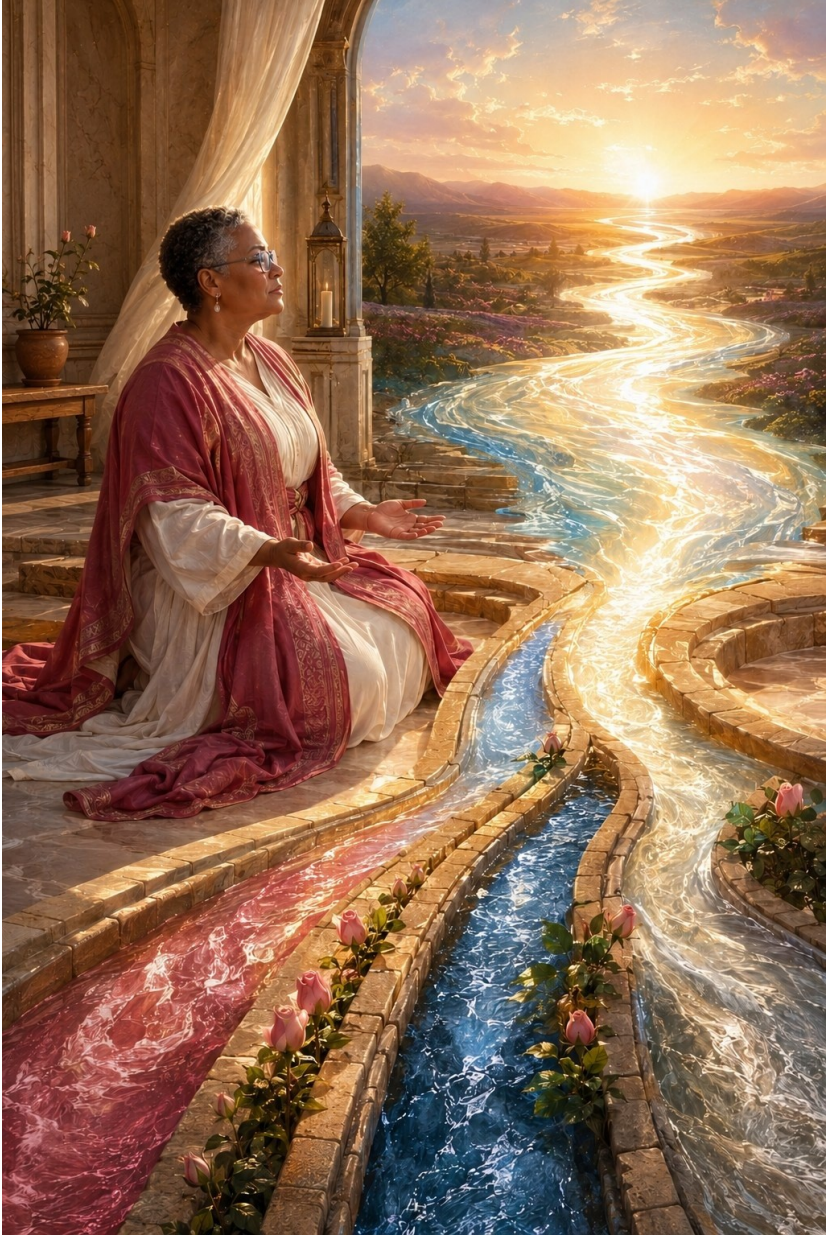
The man retained his humanity.

Authenticity required accuracy and coherence.

Appendix A

The Ten Mirrors

A Lifetime Reflection Beneath the Holiness of God

A Letter to the Reader Who Is Still Becoming

Dear Reader,

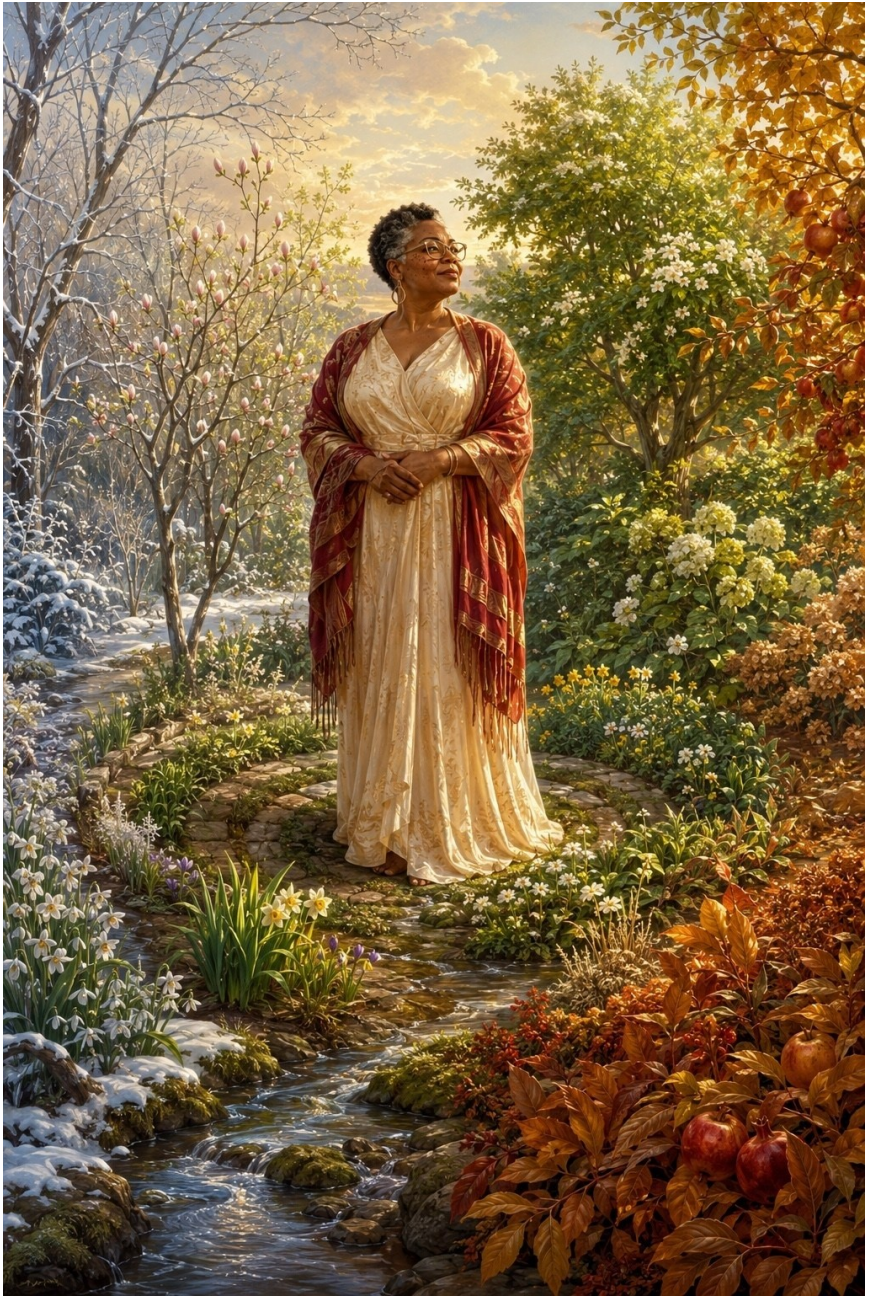
